Reassessing Security:

SUMMIT PARK AND ITS NEIGHBORS MUST L

ow NOT to communicate is exquisitely portrayed in this brief 19th century poem about Boston society. "Here's to good old Boston, home of the bean and the cod, where the Lowells speak only to the Cabots and the Cabots speak only to God."

Communications today is even more unspeakable when you think about it. While we friend each other on Twitter and like each other on Facebook, we often won't go out of our way to actually speak to each other as neighbors.

And that's why Neighborhood Watch programs fail.


With the help of the County

Sheriff's Department, the Chatsworth Lake Manor town council is reassessing its security procedures based more on technology than on old-fashioned word of mouth. They're urging residents of the picturesque enclave at the foot of Woolsey Canyon Drive to purchase lock mailboxes, install perimeter security cameras and immediately report anything suspicious to the Malibu/Lost Hills Sheriff Station at 818-878-1808. Of course if neighbors decide to look out for each other by actually talking to each other, that's okay too.

The same thinking should apply to the Summit. "While we have a

security gate and are not as exposed to traffic as our neighbors below, we're not invulnerable in any sense of the word," said Philip Miller, Summit co-owner. "Fighting crime and other emergencies is a growing necessity that must be proactively pursued. I urge all residents to install security cameras and home alarm systems; to lock their mailboxes, to ask neighbors to hold packages delivered while they're at work, and to stay in close contact with each other and with law enforcement officials," he explained.

Six years ago, Madoline Gamble, the Summit's longtime night manager, spent many hours

preparing a 17-page neighborhood watch plan under the heading of Emergency Preparedness. It's all there in a binder, evacuation procedures in case of wild fires and what to do in case of other disasters including earthquakes and even floods. There's also a huge list of first responders from the fire and sheriff's departments to animal control shelters.

But Mrs. Gamble was unable to find tenants willing to participate in the plan. "Life is becoming more and more hard-scrabble," she says. "People who are now holding down two and three jobs don't have the time to be neighborhood watchers

and activists."

She seconds the concept that communications today is in many ways worse than it was in times long past. "It's bad enough that we friend each other on Twitter and like each other on Facebook without actually speaking to each other as neighbors. But it's gotten worse than that. Those who embrace social media are becoming spooked by the large and growing amounts of personal information randomly contained in their social web accounts," she charges.


Part of the solution may lie in combining high tech security cameras and alarm systems with good old fashioned street parties and barbecues. "We've got to bring the personal touch back into our daily lives by neighbor to neighbor contact and by exchanging information over our cell phones as we once did over the back fence," she believes.

"Open your eyes," concluded the night manager. "Stop believing that as long as we act like moles or ostriches and stick our heads in the sand, our problems will pass us by. That's not the case. You cannot fix a problem or right a wrong by ignoring it." .*

SUMMIT EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN

Here, for your ongoing reference, is a clear, detailed map of every mobile home at the Summit with house numbers. The evacuation map on page 5 shows the order in which residents of each home must leave the park in a major emergency when no first responders are present to direct traffic.





Madoline Gamble's emergency evacuation plan assumes that a wild fire would first threaten the park's outside perimeter before burning its way inward. The right side of the park in green would evacuate first through the main entrance gate on Summit Drive while the left side of the park in red would evacuate through the emergency gate on Summer Wind Court.

1. Can you tell me about your business? What is the focus of what you do there?

Sustainable Shelter is a general contracting firm focused primarily on the construction of new custom residential homes as well as providing remodeling and restoration services. Our goal is to provide a service-based business to our clients and to build quality efficient homes. We provide construction services along with design and drafting services, budget development and value engineering, building department assistance and general preconstruction consultation.

I grew up and live in the San Fernando Valley. I attended Columbus Junior



Mayo Clinic Health Letter: IF YOU WANNA USE THE SAUNA, IT COULD DECREASE YOUR CHANCES OF A HEART ATTACK BY UP TO AN AMAZING 63 PERCENT

ccording to Mayo Clinic's March Health Letter, men who used a sauna from four to seven times a week reduced their risk of dying from a sudden cardiac event by 63 percent. The research study was conducted in Finland using 2,300 male recruits, the letter said.

"The results show that men who used a sauna two to three times a week had about a 22 percent reduced risk of dying of a sudden cardiac event compared with men who only used a sauna once a week," the Mayo Clinic report explained.

"Risk of sudden cardiac death declined for men whose saunas lasted longer than 11 minutes, compared with men who took shorter saunas.



The study also found that men who took more frequent saunas lived longer than did those who took less frequent saunas."

"Researchers were only able to speculate as to why sauna use seems beneficial," the report noted. "It may be because the heart rate generally increases during sauna use to a level that's similar to low to moderately intense exercise. Sauna use also appears to help lower blood pressure, improve function of blood vessels and affect the nervous system in a way that reduces risk of heart rhythm problems."

"It's also possible that other factors contributed to the benefit including simple relaxation or the social aspect involved in using a public sauna or sauna at a health club."

(Editor's Note: With or without parent approval, children under 14-years-of age are not allowed in the park's sauna or spa facilities).
